Nevada Statewide & Metro Area Labor Market Overview

October 2023

Published on November 16, 2023

In October 2023, the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Nevada was unchanged and still sits at 5.4 percent. The labor force in the state once again grew, this time by about 7,000. Moreover, nearly all of this growth was due to increases in employment as the number of unemployed individuals only grew by about 600.

On top of the growth in the number of employed individuals, the state also saw growth in its number of jobs. The total non-farm employment in Nevada increased by about 5,500 and the Lesiure and Hospitality industry continued it's recovery by adding 1,600 jobs over the month. Other industries that added a significant amount of jobs included Government, which added 1,100, and Other Services, which added 2,500.

The Las Vegas MSA saw an increase equivalent to 1,600 jobs (or 0.1%) over the month. Meanwhile, the Reno MSA saw an increase of 800 jobs (or 0.3%). Finally, the Carson City MSA saw a decrease of 100 jobs (-0.3%)

Current Employment Statistics (CES)

Estimates for this section come from the Current Employment Statistics (CES) program sponsored by the Bureau of Labor statistics (<u>BLS</u>). Total nonfarm employment increased by 5,500 jobs from September to October, a growth rate of 0.4%. Since October 2022, total nonfarm employment increased by 52,200 jobs, or 3.4%. 



Nevada vs U.S. Employment Growth







Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS)

Figures for our unemployment estimates come from the Local Area Unemployment Statistics (LAUS) program sponsored by the (<u>BLS</u>). Nevada's unemployment rate was 5.4 percent in October, was unchanged from 5.4 percent in September, and decreased by 0.1 percentage point from 5.5 percent in 2022, seasonally adjusted. The number of unemployed individuals increased by 628 from September for a current level of 87,235 people, which increased by 309 unemployed people since 2022. The labor force in Nevada is currently 1,607,497 people, which increased by 7,134 people from September, and increased by 39,420 people since 2022.




Unemployment Rate State Rankings (Prior Month's Data)


According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Nevada had the highest unemployment rate in the nation for the month of September 2023, at a figure of 5.4 percent. This is 0.7 percentage points higher than the second highest, which was observed in California.




Employment State Rankings (Prior Month's Data)

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Nevada has had the largest over-the-year percentage increase in non-farm payrolls in September 2023 at a figure of 3.4 percent. Narrowly trailing Nevada was Texas, where a figure of 3.2 percent was observed.





Employment growth year-over-year September



Unemployment Insurance

Turning to our monthly data, in October 2023, 10,276 initial claims for unemployment insurance were filed in Nevada, an increase of 1422 claims, or 16.1 percent, from September 2023 when there were 8,854 claims. This figure is an increase from the 8,658 figure that was observed in October of 2022.


State of Nevada Unemployment Insurance Activity




Over-the-year claims activity for Nevada's regular program saw increases across most measures in October. The number of weeks compensated increased by 12,967, resulting in \$37.8 million in benefit payments, an increase of 20.3 percentage points from September 2023. First payments totaled 4,976 in October, up 14.4 percentage points over the month. Final payments, also known as benefit exhaustions, increased to 2,108, up 27.2 percentage points from September.




